Sometimes art is messy and confusing and strange. Sometimes art is a question. Sometimes it's an answer.

Perceived Barriers is our exploration of ideas and process. A way to keep thinking into and thinking through what it means to live, and love, and make art from regional South Australia.

NAVIGATING THE EXHIBITION

- The exhibition starts at the bottom of the stairs, the journey to the main exhibition space represents how the process of arriving at an outcome is part of the project
- Once you reach the top of the stairs, enter via the first doorway on the right
- Take your time passing through. Not all of the works are immediately obvious
- When you reach the desk in the corner, pause and take a seat to read and respond to Love Notes to the Laundromat
- Linger by the television to see behind the scenes, process as practice
- As you pass the cane chair, stop and take a seat. Join us in silent conversation
- Notice the questions in the kitchen doorway. Consider any questions you have
- Exit via the door through which you entered
